



KCASA Annual Report 1 April 2022 to 31 March 2023

Chairman's Report

KCASA continues to run with the support of an ever-decreasing number of dedicated volunteers. I applaud all involved and thank them enormously for the contributions made be they large or small.

The primary purpose of the KCASA is to manage the aquatic disciplines and activities that take place within its boundaries, and we are very reliant on the engagement and support of member clubs that operate in these sports. It is very clear that some disciplines; Competitive, Masters and Artistic Swimming, along with Water Polo are very active within the County, whilst others: Open Water, Disability and Para Swimming along with Diving, are less so. I strongly encourage clubs that take part in the non-represented activities to come on board and get involved. The KCASA team are here to support activities that promote development so please don't miss out on opportunities that may be available.

Whilst the total number of active athletes in the County is still lower than it was in 2019, it is pleasing to report that we have seen an increase in numbers over the last year.

Facilities in the County continue to fall well below the standard we would like, leaving us in the precarious and hugely expensive position of using out-of-County pools to run our main swimming championships and host the Inter County Masters competition. Of course, KCASA has no influence on where and how new pools are built but we are keen to support any activity that is taking place.

The financial fallout from this has and will continue to be substantial and, as a result, we recently set up a small working group to take a closer look at the burden involved in operating at this level and to ensure our financial reserves remain in a healthy position in the future. We do believe that the current activities of our organisation must be funded by its active membership and whilst it's OK to fall back on reserve funds for planned activity, we cannot continue to do so on an unplanned basis.

Swim England has recently launched its Governance Code for Counties. Having attended an initial launch and subsequent review meeting it is pleasing to report that KCASA looks in good shape to attain the standards required. Work has already begun on submissions and will ultimately become part of what we do moving forwards.

The highlight of the County swimming year was to see the Kent Team crowned as Inter County Champions in October 2022. This was an amazing achievement and I congratulate all of the swimmers, coaches and team managers involved.

Finally, I would like to say a huge thank-you to all involved in the day to day running of aquatic sports in the county. Well done! The work you undertake is sometimes thankless but it is amazing, and thousands of athletes of all ages and abilities can only do what they do with your support. Keep up the great work and as always, if I or any of my colleagues at KCASA can assist you, please get in touch.

President's Report

It has been a great honour to be the president of Kent Swimming. I took on the role as the swimming world was coming out of Covid, dealing with new challenges around organising what has become the county's largest event - the county swimming championships. eighth year. There were no presentations that year because of Covid, which made the dual role logistically possible.

In October 2022, I was fortunate to be the president when Kent won its first National County Team Championship, something that will live in my memory and, I suspect, most of the team involved for many years to come! Hopefully Kent will succeed again next month.



November saw the county host the South East Masters round of the National Masters Team competition at the LAC, which saw Kent achieve 11th place from the 33 counties that entered,

The county championships 2023, were a little surreal for me personally having been responsible for so much in previous years, to be able to enjoy the event and congratulate the winners, was a very different experience!

I would like to thank everyone that has helped the county in whatever form - the sheer amount of volunteer help involved across all the disciplines is outstanding, and I hope the county succeeds for another 132 years.

Financial Report for the year to 31 March 2023

Funds: The funds held in the bank have decreased from 31 March 2022 (£107,451) to 31 March 2023 (£83,271) by £24,180. We are, however, still in a healthy position.

Overall Picture: As can be seen from the annual accounts, the county would have suffered a significant loss had we not, as stated in last year's annual report, released a provision from some 6 years ago of in excess of

£21,000. This has allowed the deficit for the year to be restricted to £4,139. This is despite a loss on the swimming championships of more than £15,000. We also hosted the Inter-County Masters event, with Swim England and Swim England South East assisting with the funding. Further explanations relating to the loss on the running of the Championships is detailed below.

Kent Swimming Championship: The 2023 year has been tough on us all, and swimming has not been shielded from this.

We managed to continue to hold the 2023 Championships Long Course, split between K2, Crawley for the long-distance events with the rest held at LAC.

The costs of Crawley were generally similar to other times that we have used them. However, the cost of using LAC is becoming ever more expensive.

We expected to make a loss in excess of £10,000 on the running of these championships, and this indeed was the case. The hire cost of LAC in itself is incredibly high, but this is exacerbated by their instance on having not only security, but also paramedic cover.

For many years, the swimming championships were profitable enough to run all the other events and activities financed by the County. This is no longer the case under the current funding model.

A working party from the Board has convened and reviewed the year's income and expenditure, and has come up with recommendations that will, hopefully, allow us to move towards breaking even on the championships going forward.

Whilst we still have significant funds, these would be quickly depleted were we to continue without making suitable changes, and so we have done so.

These involve changing of the programme of events in terms of the running order, which should allow for better use of the time allocated, along with, unfortunately, an increase in individual entry fees. Having reviewed the entry fees for open meets held at LAC, and the general entry fees charged by other counties, it has become obvious that we have been significantly cheaper than both. Whilst we have had to make this decision, we have decided to increase to entry fees to a level which we feel is viable to our members without exceeding the costs charged elsewhere.

County Levy: As with previous years, we have once again charged a levy on all swimmers in Club Train and Club Compete memberships. In order to assist with the rising costs to the county, a decision was made by the same working party to increase this to £3.00 per member. This allows for the increased costs faced by the county to be partly funded by all those involved in the pool in the county, and just by those in the county championships.

Investment Income: Obviously holding reasonably large deposits, we have now started to earn more interest from our deposit accounts, which is where most of our funding is placed. In the 2023 year we earned £419 compared with just £10 in 2022.

It is felt however that there are better rates to be found by depositing some of the funds other than in standard business reserve accounts, and we are looking at the best available rates to allow us to make the County's money work for its members but leaving us with sufficient liquid funds to continue day-to-day activities. By the time the ACM occurs, I would hope that these deposits would already be in place.

Welfare Officer Report

My name is Chelsey, and I took over the position of Kent County Welfare Officer in March 2023.

I volunteered for the role as I believe that nothing is more important than the happiness and wellbeing of the children within our sport, and, as a coach, I know that happy swimmers are the most successful swimmers. My main goal during my tenure as County Welfare Officer is to work proactively to create a culture within our sport where every swimmer is treated fairly and has their welfare as the paramount consideration.

Some of the key ways I will be looking to achieve this include:

- Offering support to clubs and swimmers, either at their own request, or that of the Swim England Child Safeguarding Team.
- Raising awareness of Wavepower, and the rights and responsibilities it confers on swimmers and clubs. This will involve working with Kent clubs to ensure their welfare and safeguarding policies are easily accessible to swimmers and their families.
- Strongly encouraging clubs to ensure that, as well as their welfare officer, key members of the committee, including chair and secretary, who may also have welfare or safeguarding concerns raised to them, have completed the appropriate child safeguarding training.
- Ensuring all relevant county members, volunteers and staff have a DBS check and have completed the appropriate safeguarding and/or other required training.

Masters Report

As the effects of COVID finally died away, the master's events programme started to return to normal but at a slower-than-expected pace with regular annual open events from pre-COVID missing

Kent-based Masters swimmers competed in the British Championships, held in Aberdeen, with great success. Medway Maritime led the way bringing home three Golds, seven Silvers and five Bronze medals.

In Swim England's National Masters Championships, held in October, swimmers competed in a 'high-quality' event with World, European and British records set. Medway Maritime SC again led the way along with Erith & District SC, with both clubs bringing home gold medals.

I would like to highlight that the ever-increasing cost of travel, hotels and events, has become challenging for our Masters to constantly travel to events planned in the north. It is a shame that British and National level events are rarely if ever planned in London or the south! This may well have a long-term effect on our Masters at this level.

Our own county championships were held in July, with 15 clubs from across the county competing. Erith & District SC continued as the overall best club, winning both the long and sprint event trophies.

The overall Swim England Decathlon points for 2022 were:

- Top Open/Male Kent Club: Medway Maritime SC with 12676 points (30/446)
- Top Female Kent Club: Erith & District SC with 11847 points (30/376)
- Top Open/Male swimmer: Mariusz Barcikowski (Medway Maritime SC) with 3672 points (106/1981)
- Top Female swimmer: Jennifer Vick (Erith & District SC) with 3733 points (85/1519)

Open Water Report

Access to open water time and space was difficult to acquire as many venues (including St Andrews) were reluctant to give over any regular reserved spaces to a quantity of swimmers to allow training and coaching.

Going forward, an agreement has been reached with Leybourne Lakes in Cuxton who will allow a regular slot for up to 15 (and in the future) 20 swimmers with myself. There are safety agreements in place, which include a risk assessment and the use of tow floats and wet suits.

There needs to be criteria in place to ensure that swimmers attending are at an appropriate level and initially the proposal would be to invite a number of Kent 800/1500m swimmers with input from club coaches.

Swimming Report

In many ways 2022/23 was one of the best seasons in Kent swimming. The highlight was when the County won the Swim England National County Team Championships in October at Sheffield for the first time ever. Congratulations to all the team who swam, their Coaches led by Dave Court and team managers Marie Atkinson-Brian and Jo Wilson.

The organization of the County Championships was not all plain sailing, but I am very grateful to - and thank - Jean Scott for all her hours of endless work in delivering what was a very fine Championships.

The difficulties which were evident last year in terms of facilities remain - in particular, the unavailability of Crystal Palace for at least for another 4/5 years. The County scoured large tracts of the Country for appropriate venues and, whilst we were able to secure K2 at Crawley for two evening sessions for the Long Distance events, we were unable to find any suitable facilities other than the LAC. Fortunately, Jean was able to secure two weekends at LAC at which we able to run the remainder of the programme.

For the 2024 Championships a similar situation exists so we will be continuing with two evening sessions at Crawley and the remainder of the Championships over two weekends at LAC.

The other major issue for the County is the cost of hiring the facilities. In particular, the cost of hiring LAC is exceptionally high. As a result, the County had to subsidise the running of the Championships in 2023 to a significant extent out of its own funds. This is not a situation which can continue so we will have no option but to increase entry fees in line with other Counties, and use other ways of making the Championships as self-sufficient as possible, whether this be by way increased charges or reduction of some costs.

After Alan Davidson stepped down after the 2022 Championships, Jean Scott offered to promote the Championships in 2023 but as she made it clear at the outset this would only be a temporary fix. We are most grateful to her for stepping into the breach and as stated above delivered a very good Championships aided by a myriad of helpers.

As time passes, the number of volunteers prepared to help with the Championships seems reduce inexorably. We are very grateful to those who have stepped forward, but we still need a lot more support from the County. As stated in last year's report, the days of one person being able to run the Championships with a few helpers are gone. The aim remains to create an Events Team thus spreading the load and allowing those who are reaching their twilight years (the writer included) to step out gracefully. So,

if anyone is interested in lending a hand in any way do have a word with one of the Committee members after the ACM or email me at any other time.

The quality of competitive swimming in the County remains exceptional, resulting in some of the most difficult county qualifying times in the country. This is a testament to the work of all the county's swimmers and coaches.

The two-day Development Meet was once more a great success. I ended up promoting this and am very grateful to those who helped out at Gillingham – in particular Lynn Gates who took care of all the technical aspects before during and after the event. The Meet has been slightly revised for 2023 but remains in its usual timeslot towards the end of October.

The Swim England Talent Pathway comprised two face-to-face camps in October and June and a virtual Camp in April. Places were offered to 48 11-Year-Old swimmers. Yet again Swim England have revised the Camp criteria so that age group for 2023/24 will now be 12 years old at the end of the year.

Thanks go to Keiron Piper who acted as Head Coach for the 11-Year-Old Pathway for 2022/23. He has now moved to Millfield and we have appointed Karen Bradbury of RTW Monson as our new lead coach.

I would again like to put on record my thanks to Marie Atkinson-Brian who has acted as our Lead Team Manager for several years and has taken on a lot of the organising responsibilities/work.

At International level, Josh Inglis of Bromley was selected for the GB Team at the European Youth Olympics in Maribor. Not only that but Josh took gold in the 100m Breaststroke. Eva Okaro of Sevenoaks was selected for the GB Youth Team in Toronto in December 2022. Eva was also selected along with Fern Sneddon of RTW Monson for the England Youth Team in Sweden in March 2023. Finally, Timothy Leberl of Beckenham swam for Mauritius in the World Championships held in Japan this year.

Congratulations to those clubs that reached the National Arena League finals in March 2022: Bromley finishing 7th in the A Final, and Sevenoaks and RTW Monson finishing 5th and 7th respectively in the B Final. The fact that three of our clubs made the finals - more than any other county - demonstrates the breadth of the competition across our county.

Finally, I am grateful to all my colleagues on the Swimming Committee for their support and assistance, and to the many people who helped in many ways to run the County Swimming events in the past year.

Swimming Technical Officials Report

During the year, Clubs started to run more galas, despite the lack of pools available for licensed meets. Officials have been able to support these, including a Level 2 Gala at Dover for the East Invicta clubs.

The Kent Championships were well-supported, and the feedback suggests that the Kent Officials performed at their usual high standard – including a quick-thinking lifesaving episode at the London Aquatic Centre!

It has been another successful year for new Kent Referees, with Lee Mullins, Jo Arundell, Jennie Londesbrough and Keith Roshier all successfully completing their classroom and poolside exams.

The J2 and J2S courses at Medway Park have been well supported with over 30 new J2 candidates, including a majority of new on-line qualified J1 officials. These courses have been welcomed by these new Officials as their first opportunity to ask questions and learn from everyone's poolside experiences.

There is still a lack of information regarding new J1 Trainees and newly qualified J1 Officials being passed down via Counties from Swim England and British Swimming. Luckily, many Clubs are now telling their members to contact me so we can put their details on the Kent Officials website. Poolside comments have expressed concerns from Referees that new Officials do not have anywhere near the poolside experience that was necessary before the J1 went online and poolside assessments were ceased.

At the end of 2022, FINA changed its name to World Aquatics and published their Rules Update for 2023. British Swimming adopted these rules on March 1st and all Licenced Officials were expected to attend a rule update CPD. This was arranged by John Burdett for Kent Officials as a series of Zoom meetings with the first being held at the end of March.

Last year I said I would be stepping down at the end of 2022, but with the new rule changes I have continued to see these through. At the time of writing, I am pleased to announce that Matt Huille will be taking on the role of County Coordinator for the London Region (Kent London) Clubs, but we are still looking for the South East Region (Kent Rural) Clubs coordinator. They will have my continuing support to take Kent Officials into the future.

South East Region Annual Report for Kent Rural Clubs

Team manager workshops: The Region continues to run both Team Manager 1/2 workshops online. In the period dating from April 2022 to March 2023, 25 members from Kent Clubs have completed the course, with a further 30 attending between April 2023 and now. Nine members across Kent have completed their Level 2 Team Manager training. With the new ratios coming in to play, there has been heavy demand for courses, with the Region significantly increasing the number of places available.

Young Volunteering programme 2023: The South East Volunteer Programme (that started in November 2022) has nine members from Kent currently signed up, four of whom are actively volunteering, with one reaching the silver award, two reaching bronze and the fourth close to achieving their bronze award.
